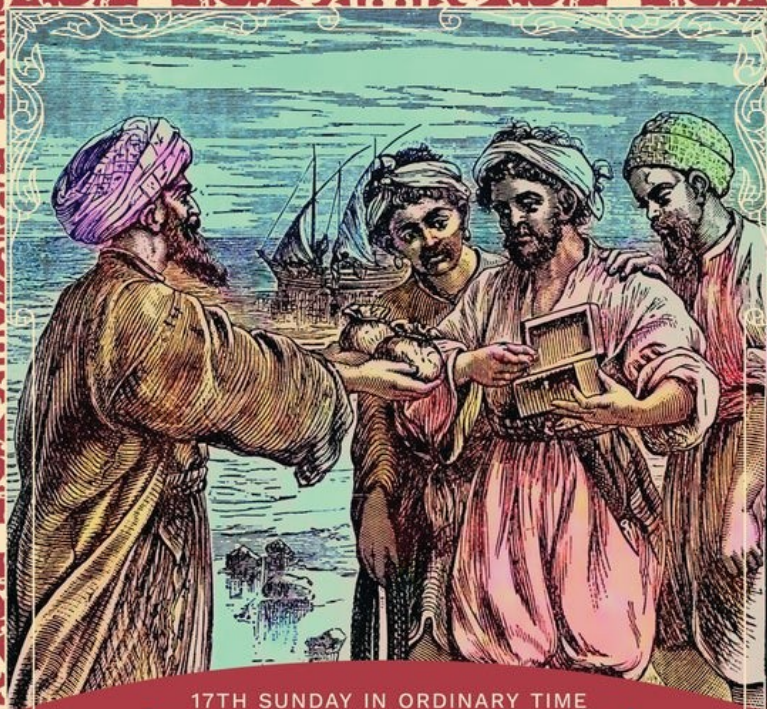

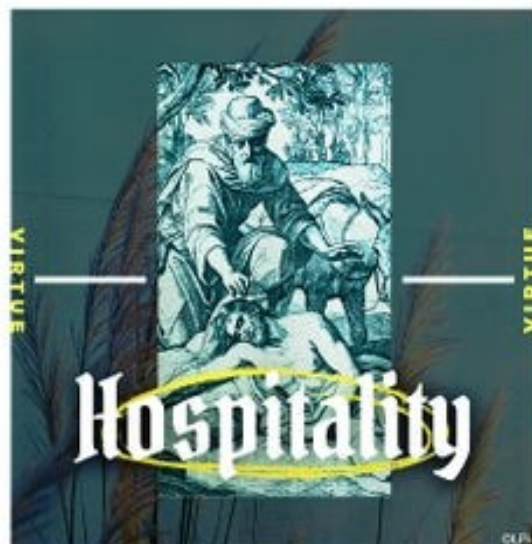

Gospel Meditation

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Around the time that the gold rushes ended in the nineteenth-century West, a curious phenomenon arose in New England known as money diggers. These were men who roamed the countryside with shovels, divining rods, and superstitious hope, convinced that treasure lay buried beneath their feet. Surely there must be gold under our feet. But there was not. The craze of these wild goose chases caused many to lose farms, families, and sanity.

In this week's Gospel, Jesus inaugurates a new era of spiritual money digging. He announces, **"The kingdom of heaven is like a treasure buried in a field."** He invites us to become treasure seekers who search in the right place. What is of greatest value is not money beneath our feet, but the infinite treasure hidden deep in the humanity of Jesus himself, God's own blessed life. The glory of heaven lies veiled in his ordinary life, his teaching, his suffering, his Church.

This teaching about the Kingdom changes things. Now we see the Church's doctrinal and moral teachings are not arbitrary rules. They are a treasure map. Follow them, and we will uncover divine happiness. Ignore them, and we will wander aimlessly, spade in hand, digging in empty fields, discouraged.

Where have we wasted energy seeking treasure in the wrong places? How have we given up on seeking the treasure of truly finding God's love for us? If so, let us repent of both. Then let us dust off our shovels and get back to digging deep into the field of Christ Jesus and his Church. After all, He never ceases seeking his treasure in us.

Choosing Heaven

My children often ask me questions about Heaven. What does Heaven look like? Is there nighttime in Heaven? Do you get hungry in Heaven? Are there oceans in Heaven? Will we feel bored in Heaven?

My answer is almost always the same: "I can't tell you for sure." I guess I didn't realize how little we actually know about Heaven until I had kids who were obsessed with hearing the details.

But accepting human ignorance is liberating in a way, because it allows me to see clearly — and cling wholeheartedly to — the three things I do know for sure: Heaven is where God is, and Hell is where He isn't, and it's completely my decision where I want to be.

The choice, you see, is everything.

We need to pay attention to how Jesus describes the kingdom of Heaven in his parables. It is, he tells us, a treasure — but a treasure buried in a field owned by someone else. It is a beautiful pearl — and a very expensive pearl. It is a bountiful yield — one which must be carefully, even painstakingly sifted through.

It's so easy to imagine the delight of the man who finds the treasure, who encounters the pearl, who hauls the bursting net aboard, just as it is easy to call ourselves followers of Christ, to hang a Rosary from our windshield and go to Mass.

It's less easy, and a great deal more uncomfortable, to contemplate what comes next: the sacrifice, the commitment, the perseverance through uncertainty.

Heaven is an incredible stroke of luck — one that requires a good deal of follow-through. We can never earn it, but we must choose it. Again and again and again, we must choose it.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

Why are Catholics required to give money to the Church?

Answer:

Offering money and other goods to God and the Church is, before all else, a statement of gratitude. We see this when we look at how our spiritual ancestors showed their gratitude to God for the gifts they had received (e.g. Genesis 14:18-20 and Genesis 28:16-22). One of the ways they offered thanks to God was through a practice called "tithing," in which 10 percent of a person's goods (crops, livestock, money, etc.) were given back to God.

Today, the practice of tithing — giving 10 percent — is still common in many Protestant communities, but it is not required for Catholics. Instead, the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* teaches us that, "The faithful also have the duty of providing for the material needs of the Church, each according to [their] own abilities" (no. 2043). This means that, although we are not bound to practice "tithing" in the traditional sense, we do share a responsibility to share our money or other resources with our parish communities. Like our spiritual ancestors, we give as a sign of our gratitude for the many gifts that God has given to us. Beyond this, we also share our resources with other Catholic organizations to help them finance their ministries, to continue and grow their outreach to the poor and the needy, and to provide just wages for their employees.

How much we give depends on our individual circumstances, but since we share a responsibility for the programs, outreach, and health of our parish communities and Catholic organizations, this question gives us a wonderful opportunity to ask some important questions about the quality of our giving and what our priorities are. Remember, we are only stewards of our time, talents, and treasures and as the First Letter of Peter reminds us, "As each one of you has received a gift, use it to serve one another as good stewards of God's varied graces" (4:10).

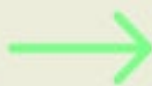

SCRIPTURE

Deuteronomy 6:1-9

REFLECT:

1. This reading contains a famous passage called the "Shema," after the words "Hear, O Israel ..." (*Shema y'Israel* in Hebrew). It is often considered to be a key to understanding the entire law given under Moses. Why do you think it carries that much significance?
2. What does it mean to love God with your whole heart, self and strength? What might this look like in practice? What keeps us from doing this?
3. Why do think this passage is concerned with handing this commandment on to one's children?

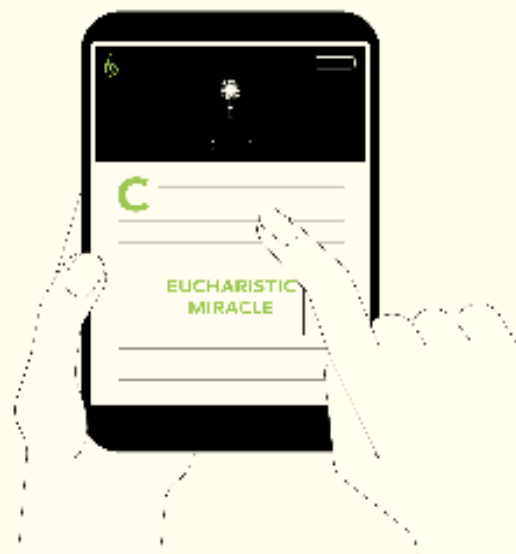
READ: A selection from *Via Fidelis* — The Christian Family (pg. 28)

We recall from the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, "Parents have the first responsibility for the education of their children. They bear witness to this responsibility first by creating a home where tenderness, respect, fidelity, and disinterested service are the rule. The home is well suited for the education in the virtues" (#2223).

In our efforts to know the faith, we assure parents of our support. We desire for families to be empowered with the spiritual and catechetical resources and encouragement they need.

REFLECT:

1. As we continue this year centered on catechesis, we are confronted in this passage with the fact that the Church recognizes that parents are the first catechists of their children. Why is this an important fact?
2. How should one's faith shape one's role as a parent? What is the "difference" that being a Christian makes in how one approaches parenting?
3. Can you think of some good examples of Christian parents either within your own family or those you know? What qualities do these individuals exhibit that make you think of them?

Feasts & Solemnities

JULY 3: ST. THOMAS, APOSTLE

He is often called "Doubting Thomas" because he did not initially believe that the other apostles had seen the risen Christ. However, his words upon encountering Christ constitute the most prominent declaration of Jesus's divine identity in the New Testament: "My Lord and my God!" (Jn 20:28). According to tradition, St. Thomas traveled as far as India on his missionary journeys, where he suffered martyrdom.

JULY 6: ST. MARIA GORRETTI, VIRGIN AND MARTYR

While still a young girl, St. Maria Gorretti was tragically and violently killed. Her resistance to her attacker was driven by her concern for the status of his soul (that he would be committing a mortal sin). She later forgave him before just her death. Her attacker, Alessandro Serenelli, served 27 years in prison, during which he experienced a deep conversion facilitated by an appearance of Maria Gorretti to him in a dream. He even attended her canonization in Rome in 1950 and later lived a life of prayer and penance as a lay Capuchin Franciscan.

JULY 14: ST. KATERI TEKAKWITHA, VIRGIN

St. Kateri Tekakwitha was the first Native American saint to be canonized. When she was very young, Kateri's immediate family died of smallpox. Although left with scarring, Kateri survived and was raised by her uncle, who was a chief of the Mohawks. After refusing the promptings of her aunt and uncle to marry, Kateri converted to Catholicism and eventually took a vow of chastity, taking only Jesus Christ as her spouse. Her aunt and uncle and others in the Mohawk community disapproved of this vow, even accusing her of sorcery. She was forced to leave her home and live with a Christian community near Montreal.

JULY 22: ST. MARY MAGDALENE

St. Mary Magdalene is famous called the "Apostle to the Apostles." As the first witness of Christ's resurrection, she is the one who first told the Apostles the Good News (see Jn 20:11-18).

JULY 25: ST. JAMES, APOSTLE

St. James "the Greater" is called thus because he is the older of the two apostles named James and because his calling by Jesus came earlier. He is the brother of John and a son of Zebedee. He, along with his brother John and Peter, is one of the three apostles present at key events in Jesus' ministry, such as the Transfiguration. According to tradition, he traveled to Spain to preach the Gospel, then traveled back to the Holy Land where he was killed by Herod. His followers subsequently brought his remains back to Spain. That site, Santiago de Compostela, was rediscovered in the ninth century and remains a popular place of pilgrimage to this day.

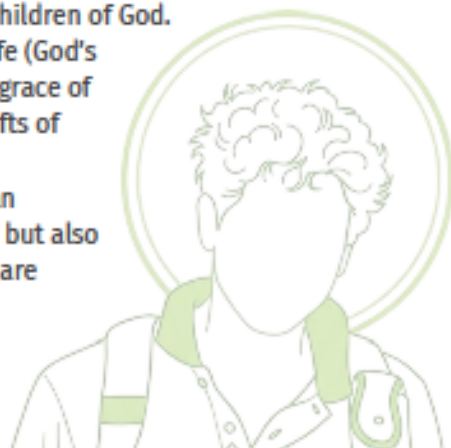
JULY 29: STS. MARTHA, MARY AND LAZARUS

Jesus famously raises Lazarus from the dead in John's Gospel, but he does so only after he weeps (Jn 11:35). The three siblings from Bethany show us that Jesus had close friends who were dear to him. In raising Lazarus from the dead, Jesus not only showed his divine power, but also gave a preview of his own resurrection.

THE LIFE OF THE CHURCH

Read the Catechism of the Catholic Church
774-776, 780-801, 1113-1131, 1691-1698

- The Church is referred to as the People of God, the Body of Christ, the Temple of the Holy Spirit, and the Bride of Christ, among other titles.
- The Church is also referred to as the "universal sacrament of salvation" because she is the sign and instrument of the reconciliation and communion God desires for all of humanity.
- Sacraments are visible and efficacious (effective) signs of grace instituted by Christ and entrusted to the Church, through which God gives divine life.
- This salvific (saving) work of the Church is especially visible in the Seven Sacraments.
- The Seven Sacraments are: Baptism, Confirmation, Holy Eucharist, Penance, Anointing of the Sick, Holy Orders and Matrimony.
- Beginning in baptism and through all the sacraments, new life is communicated to the faithful.
- This is a life as children of God.
- It is the divine life (God's life) lived in the grace of Christ and the gifts of the Holy Spirit.
- Life in Christ is an elevated calling, but also one to which all are called.

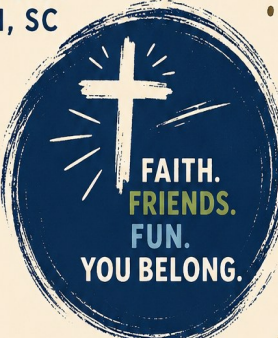
